

ASLN 1102: Elementary American Sign Language II

Syllabus

Spring 2023

Credits: 4

<u>Prerequisites:</u> ASLN 1101 Elementary American Sign Language I or consent of the instructor.

Course Description:

Building on ASL I, this course covers in depth the structure of ASL Grammar, fingerspelling, numbers, and visual/gestural communication. Students also develop expressive and receptive skills in storytelling and dialogue. This class will enhance the student's comprehension of the storytelling structure and cohesion. Emphasis will be on character development, role shifting and story cohesion. We stress an emphasis on receptive and expressive skills through student-teacher interaction. The course includes direct teaching and interactive learning, which allows students to thrive and succeed in a full-immersed signing learning environment. You are expected to participate in all required activities and interact by signing and/or using gestures. There is also a no voice policy in class as you will be expected to use ASL as much as you can.

ACTFL Learning Outcomes:

The language and culture learning outcomes are closely tied to the objectives for learning a second language and fostering cultural competency. The student outcomes for culture and second language learning are derived from the <u>Standards for Learning American Sign Language</u> and the <u>ACTFL's 5 Cs</u>, or goals. These are: 1) Communication, 2) Cultures, 3) Connections, 4) Comparisons, and 5) Communities. You will demonstrate knowledge of or an ability to:

- engage in a variety of communicative tasks using American Sign Language (ASL) and participate in informal and formal conversations on a variety of topics.
- examine your own cultural beliefs, behaviors, and norms by reflecting on your experiences participating in Deaf culture related events with a better understanding of the American Deaf culture.

- acquire information and diverse perspectives in order to use ASL in academic or career-related situations.
- use ASL to reflect on the nature of language and culture through comparisons with your own primary language and cultural identity.
- use ASL within and beyond the classroom to interact and collaborate with the Deaf community.

Course Goals: The goals of the course are to improve students':

- Ability to recognize and demonstrate proper grammar structures in ASL.
- Receptive and expressive skills
- Knowledge and use of number incorporation
- Understanding and expanding use of classifier skills.
- Skills incorporating non-manual markers and body shifts

Course Objectives: At the end of the course the student will be able to:

- Express themselves with proper ASL Grammar and format
- Use classifiers in ASL for descriptors when signing
- Utilize the 5 parameters of ASL appropriately.
- Utilize time descriptors, NMM, and correct spatial placement when signing
- Understand another persons' ASL (receptive skills)

Participation: Participation is important and will be reflected in the final grade. In an interactive class, students depend on each other for practicing in and outside of the classroom. I always tell my students this – the best way to learn ASL is to use it so you will be expected to be active in class. On a side note: while the college does not require an attendance policy, you do need to attend class to earn participation points.

ASL Event Paper: You will attend two Deaf events or "sign language" events either in person or virtually. Write a 1–2-page paper that shares your observations, experience, and relations.

Quizzes: There will be two short written/receptive quizzes throughout the semester. Quizzes will be administered at the end of the week (Fridays).

Midterm Project: You will present "The Very Hungry Caterpillar" in ASL on GoReact. Further expectations will be discussed in class.

Final Exam Project: You will choose a Children's storybook and translate the entire book into ASL on GoReact. Further expectations will be discussed in class.

GoReact Assignments: You will do recordings on specific topics to be announced in class and HuskyCT. You will post your recordings on GoReact and you will receive detailed feedback for language building skills purposes.
